

**EXECUTIVE ORDERS, PROCLAMATIONS OF
GENERAL APPLICABILITY, AND STATEMENTS
ISSUED BY THE GOVERNOR
PURSUANT TO A.R.S. § 41-1013(B)(3)**

The Administrative Procedure Act (APA) requires the full-text publication of all Executive Orders and Proclamations of General Applicability issued by the Governor. In addition, the *Register* shall include each statement filed by the Governor in granting a commutation, pardon or reprieve, or stay or suspension of execution where a sentence of death is imposed. With the exception of egregious errors, content (including spelling, grammar, and punctuation) of these orders has been reproduced as submitted.

*** PEARL HARBOR REMEMBRANCE DAY 2005 ***

WHEREAS, on the morning of December 7, 1941, America was attacked without warning at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii by the air and naval forces of Imperial Japan. More than 2,400 persons perished and another 1,100 were wounded. Our Pacific Fleet was crippled and our air power was critically damaged; and

WHEREAS, the losses suffered that day shocked our Nation with the realization that American soil was not immune to the ravages of war; and

WHEREAS, the attack jolted our Nation and forced us into a World War of devastation and brought forth unparalleled courage and determination from soldiers and civilians alike; and

WHEREAS, in response, Americans answered our country's call to the battlefield, to work in the factories, farms, mines, and shipyards, remembering Pearl Harbor by their deeds, their devotion to duty, and their willingness to fight for freedom. The attack at Pearl Harbor fired the American spirit with a determination that freedom would not fall to tyranny; and the United States fought to victory, preserving a world in which democracy could grow; and

WHEREAS, it is vital that we pass on to a new generation of Americans the lessons learned from the Pearl Harbor attack, and remain vigilant against threats to our values of democracy and freedom; and

WHEREAS, this State and Nation owe a great debt to those men and women who served in the military during this time and we especially recognize, today, the loss of the personnel who went down with the U.S.S. Arizona; and

WHEREAS, so that future generations understand and appreciate the sacrifice that these courageous veterans made to ensure our freedom, we set aside time on this 63rd anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor to honor those who served our nation;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Janet Napolitano, Governor of the State of Arizona, do hereby proclaim December 7, 2005 as

and call upon all Arizonans to honor the Veterans of World War II and especially those who died defending our freedom, and to recognize the scope and significance of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

*** BILL OF RIGHTS DAY ***

WHEREAS, the First Ten Amendments to the Constitution of the United States of America, known collectively as the Bill of Rights, were ratified on December 15, 1791; and

WHEREAS, the Bill of Rights recognizes, affirms and protects fundamental human and civil rights for people of all races who have struggled for thousands of years; and

WHEREAS, to preserve the rights and freedoms secured by the Bill of Rights, our Forefathers, and hundreds of thousands of men and women serving on the police agencies and Armed Forces of the United States, have sacrificed, suffered and died; and

WHEREAS, the rights and freedoms guaranteed by the Bill of Rights deserve perennial celebrations; the sacrifices made to protect the Bill of Rights deserve eternal remembrance; and

WHEREAS, several of the original States refused to ratify the Constitution without an express Bill of Rights; and

WHEREAS, to commemorate the Bill of Rights with a special day would honor the fundamental rights it enshrines and the sacrifices made to create and preserve these rights;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Janet Napolitano, Governor of the state of Arizona, do hereby proclaim December 15, 2005 as

in Arizona, and urge all citizens to observe this day with appropriate activities in their schools and communities.

Whereas, on International Human Rights Day, Dec. 10, 2006, tens of thousands of workers and allies will mobilize to restore workers' freedom to form a union; and

Whereas, the freedom to join a union is recognized internationally as a fundamental human right, deeply rooted in international and U.S. law; and

Whereas, the freedom to join a union is an important aspect of the freedom of association, which the United Nations recognized in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, ratified in 1948 by Eleanor Roosevelt and four-fifths of the member countries of the United Nations; and

Whereas, union membership can provide workers better wages and benefits, protection from discrimination and unsafe workplaces while benefiting whole communities by strengthening tax bases, promoting equal treatment and enhancing civic participation;

NOW THEREFORE, I, Janet Napolitano, Governor of the State of Arizona, do hereby proclaim December 10, 2005 as

in Arizona.
