ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

The paper copy of the *Administrative Register* (A.A.R.) is the official publication for rules and rulemaking activity in the state of Arizona.

Rulemaking is defined in Arizona Revised Statutes known as the Arizona Administrative Procedure Act (APA), A.R.S. Title 41, Chapter 6, Articles 1 through 10.

The Office of the Secretary of State does not interpret or enforce rules published in the *Arizona Administrative Register* or *Code*. Questions should be directed to the state agency responsible for the promulgation of the rule as provided in its published filing.

The *Register* is cited by volume and page number. Volumes are published by calendar year with issues published weekly. Page numbering continues in each weekly issue.

In addition, the *Register* contains the full text of the Governor's Executive Orders and Proclamations of general applicability, summaries of Attorney General opinions, notices of rules terminated by the agency, and the Governor's appointments of state officials and members of state boards and commissions.

ABOUT RULES

Rules can be: made (all new text); amended (rules on file, changing text); repealed (removing text); or renumbered (moving rules to a different Section number). Rules activity published in the *Register* includes: proposed, final, emergency, expedited, and exempt rules as defined in the APA.

Rulemakings initiated under the APA as effective on and after January 1, 1995, include the full text of the rule in the *Register*. New rules in this publication (whether proposed or made) are denoted with underlining; repealed text is stricken.

WHERE IS A "CLEAN" COPY OF THE FINAL OR EXEMPT RULE PUBLISHED IN THE REGISTER?

The *Arizona Administrative Code* (A.A.C.) contains the codified text of rules. The A.A.C. contains rules promulgated and filed by state agencies that have been approved by the Attorney General or the Governor's Regulatory Review Council. The *Code* also contains rules exempt from the rulemaking process.

The printed *Code* is the official publication of a rule in the A.A.C., and is prima facie evidence of the making, amendment, or repeal of that rule as provided by A.R.S. § 41-1012. Paper copies of rules are available by full Chapter or by subscription. The *Code* is posted online for free.

LEGAL CITATIONS AND FILING NUMBERS

On the cover: Each agency is assigned a Chapter in the *Arizona Administrative Code* under a specific Title. Titles represent broad subject areas. The Title number is listed first; with the acronym A.A.C., which stands for the *Arizona Administrative Code*; following the Chapter number and Agency name, then program name. For example, the Secretary of State has rules on rulemaking in Title 1, Chapter 1 of the *Arizona Administrative Code*. The citation for this chapter is 1 A.A.C. 1, Secretary of State, Rules and Rulemaking

Every document filed in the office is assigned a file number. This number, enclosed in brackets, is located at the top right of the published documents in the *Register*. The original filed document is available for 10 cents a copy.

Participate in the Process

Look for the Agency Notice

Review (inspect) notices published in the *Arizona Administrative Register*. Many agencies maintain stakeholder lists and would be glad to inform you when they proposed changes to rules. Check an agency's website and its newsletters for news about notices and meetings.

Feel like a change should be made to a rule and an agency has not proposed changes? You can petition an agency to make, amend, or repeal a rule. The agency must respond to the petition. (See A.R.S. § 41-1033)

Attend a public hearing/meeting

Attend a public meeting that is being conducted by the agency on a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. Public meetings may be listed in the Preamble of a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking or they may be published separately in the *Register*. Be prepared to speak, attend the meeting, and make an oral comment.

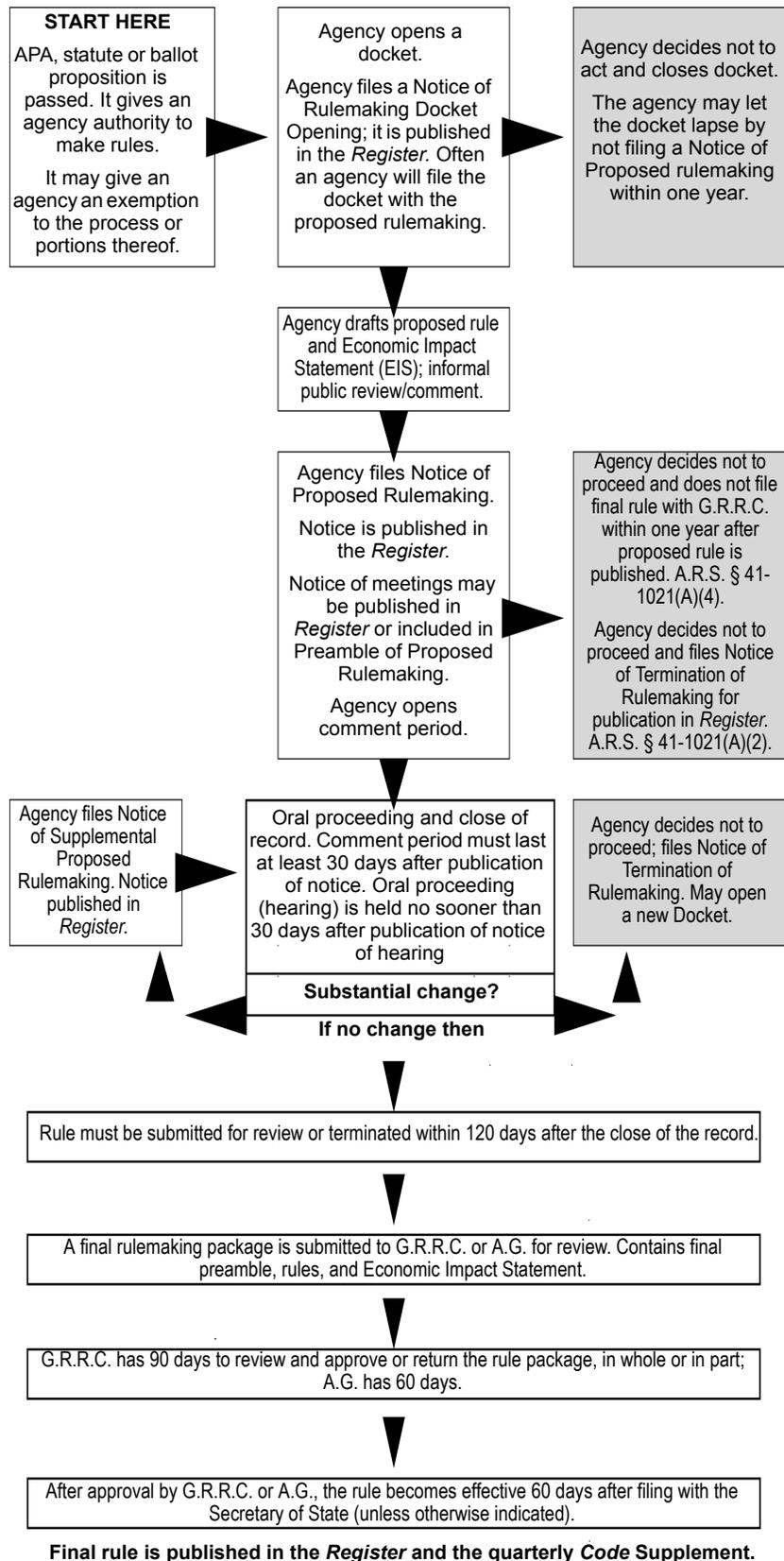
An agency may not have a public meeting scheduled on the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. If not, you may request that the agency schedule a proceeding. This request must be put in writing within 30 days after the published Notice of Proposed Rulemaking.

Write the agency

Put your comments in writing to the agency. In order for the agency to consider your comments, the agency must receive them by the close of record. The comment must be received within the 30-day comment timeframe following the *Register* publication of the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking.

You can also submit to the Governor's Regulatory Review Council written comments that are relevant to the Council's power to review a given rule (A.R.S. § 41-1052). The Council reviews the rule at the end of the rulemaking process and before the rules are filed with the Secretary of State.

Arizona Regular Rulemaking Process



Definitions

Arizona Administrative Code (A.A.C.): Official rules codified and published by the Secretary of State's Office. Available online at www.azsos.gov.

Arizona Administrative Register (A.A.R.): The official publication that includes filed documents pertaining to Arizona rulemaking. Available online at www.azsos.gov.

Administrative Procedure Act (APA): A.R.S. Title 41, Chapter 6, Articles 1 through 10. Available online at www.azleg.gov.

Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S.): The statutes are made by the Arizona State Legislature during a legislative session. They are compiled by Legislative Council, with the official publication codified by Thomson West. Citations to statutes include Titles which represent broad subject areas. The Title number is followed by the Section number. For example, A.R.S. § 41-1001 is the definitions Section of Title 41 of the Arizona Administrative Procedures Act. The "§" symbol simply means "section." Available online at www.azleg.gov.

Chapter: A division in the codification of the *Code* designating a state agency or, for a large agency, a major program.

Close of Record: The close of the public record for a proposed rulemaking is the date an agency chooses as the last date it will accept public comments, either written or oral.

Code of Federal Regulations (CFR): The *Code of Federal Regulations* is a codification of the general and permanent rules published in the *Federal Register* by the executive departments and agencies of the federal government.

Docket: A public file for each rulemaking containing materials related to the proceedings of that rulemaking. The docket file is established and maintained by an agency from the time it begins to consider making a rule until the rulemaking is finished. The agency provides public notice of the docket by filing a Notice of Rulemaking Docket Opening with the Office for publication in the *Register*.

Economic, Small Business, and Consumer Impact Statement (EIS): The EIS identifies the impact of the rule on private and public employment, on small businesses, and on consumers. It includes an analysis of the probable costs and benefits of the rule. An agency includes a brief summary of the EIS in its preamble. The EIS is not published in the *Register* but is available from the agency promulgating the rule. The EIS is also filed with the rulemaking package.

Governor's Regulatory Review (G.R.R.C.): Reviews and approves rules to ensure that they are necessary and to avoid unnecessary duplication and adverse impact on the public. G.R.R.C. also assesses whether the rules are clear, concise, understandable, legal, consistent with legislative intent, and whether the benefits of a rule outweigh the cost.

Incorporated by Reference: An agency may incorporate by reference standards or other publications. These standards are available from the state agency with references on where to order the standard or review it online.

Federal Register (FR): The *Federal Register* is a legal newspaper published every business day by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). It contains federal agency regulations; proposed rules and notices; and executive orders, proclamations, and other presidential documents.

Session Laws or "Laws": When an agency references a law that has not yet been codified into the Arizona Revised Statutes, use the word "Laws" is followed by the year the law was passed by the Legislature, followed by the Chapter number using the abbreviation "Ch.," and the specific Section number using the Section symbol (§). For example, Laws 1995, Ch. 6, § 2. Session laws are available at www.azleg.gov.

United States Code (U.S.C.): The Code is a consolidation and codification by subject matter of the general and permanent laws of the United States. The Code does not include regulations issued by executive branch agencies, decisions of the federal courts, treaties, or laws enacted by state or local governments.

About Preambles

The Preamble is the part of a rulemaking package that contains information about the rulemaking and provides agency justification and regulatory intent.

It includes reference to the specific statutes authorizing the agency to make the rule, an explanation of the rule, reasons for proposing the rule, and the preliminary Economic Impact Statement.

The information in the Preamble differs between rulemaking notices used and the stage of the rulemaking.



NOTICES OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

This section of the *Arizona Administrative Register* contains Notices of Proposed Rulemakings.

A proposed rulemaking is filed by an agency upon completion and submittal of a Notice of Rulemaking Docket Opening. Often these two documents are filed at the same time and published in the same *Register* issue.

When an agency files a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking under the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), the notice is published in the *Register* within three weeks of filing. See the publication schedule in the back of each issue of the *Register* for more information.

Under the APA, an agency must allow at least 30 days to elapse after the publication of the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking in the *Register* before beginning any proceedings for making, amending, or repealing any rule (A.R.S. §§ 41-1013 and 41-1022).

The Office of the Secretary of State is the filing office and publisher of these rules. Questions about the interpretation of the proposed rules should be addressed to the agency that promulgated the rules. Refer to item #4 below to contact the person charged with the rulemaking and item #10 for the close of record and information related to public hearings and oral comments.

About Arizona Notaries

A notary is a public officer commissioned by the Office of the Secretary of State (Office) to perform notarial acts as defined in Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S). Notaries serve as independent, unbiased, neutral officers who take required steps in authenticating signatures and completing notarial transactions. Government offices, businesses and the public rely on the accuracy and integrity of notaries public to perform the required steps to authenticate signatures and ensure that all notarizations are completed properly. Notaries play an important role in preventing fraud and forgery while bolstering the authenticity of a document.

History of Arizona Fees

Until 1996, Arizona notaries were allowed to charge up to 75¢, at which time the notary fee was increased under Arizona law to \$2. The notary public could charge a person “zero” for the notarization service up to the \$2 fee allowed under the law.

Laws 2000, Ch. 210, § 3 removed the fees schedule for notarizations out of A.R.S. § 41-316 and required the Office to prescribe fees in rule. At that time, the Office adopted emergency rules and renewed the emergency before adopting a permanent fee schedule in 2001 under Section R2-12-1102.

The Office did not raise fees when adopting this rule, rather it kept the fees as originally established in 1996; up to \$2 per signature notarized, oath administered or page certified. Therefore, fees a notary MAY charge have not increased in 21 years. Due to the importance of a notary’s function, the Office is proposing that fees be adjusted and increased to compensate for their time, effort, and assumed liability.



Under this proposed amendment, a notary still has the option to not charge a fee for a notarization. The Office has always allowed notaries public to manage fees and personally understand the potential ramifications when setting their own fee structures versus others who may charge a lower fee, or those who do not charge fees. It should be noted that the Office does not charge for notarizations, and as such, the state will not see any additional revenue on these proposed changes.

Under the proposed amendments a notary public will be required to inform consumers of the notary’s fee before performing the notarial act. When quoted, the consumer will make the determination whether he or she wants to pay the fee or look elsewhere for lower-priced notarial services. Additionally, notaries public will now be required to post their fee schedule in a conspicuous location.

ARTICLE 11. NOTARY PUBLIC BONDS AND FEES

R2-12-1102. Notary Public Fees

- A.** Pursuant to A.R.S. § 38-412, a notary public shall keep posted at all times in a conspicuous location, the fee schedule listed under subsection (E)(1) through (3).
- B.** Upon reviewing the fees schedule under subsection (E)(1) through (3), a notary shall select a standard fee, from “no charge” up to the maximum \$10 fee for a notarial act. Once a fee is established, a notary public shall be consistent when charging fees and post their fee schedule in a conspicuous location.
- C.** When posting fees under subsections (A) and (B), notaries shall use the template in Exhibit 1. Notary Public Services.
- D.** Before performing any notarial act, the notary public shall inform the requestor of the service fee if one will be charged.
- E.** A Notary public may charge the following fees:
 1. For an ~~acknowledgments~~ acknowledgment or jurat, \$2 “no charge” up to \$10 per notary public signature;
 2. For jurats, \$2 per signature;
 3. For a copy ~~certifications~~ certification, \$2 “no charge” up to \$10 per page certified;
 4. For an ~~oaths~~ oath or ~~affirmations~~ affirmation without a signature, “no charge” up to \$10 per notarial act.

NOTICES OF RULEMAKING DOCKET OPENING

NOTICES OF PROPOSED DELEGATION AGREEMENTS

This section of the *Arizona Administrative Register* contains Notices of Proposed Delegation Agreements.

The Administrative Procedure Act requires the publication of notices of proposed delegation agreements in the Register. A delegation agreement is an agreement between an agency and a political subdivision that authorizes the political subdivision to exercise functions, powers, or duties conferred on the delegating agency by a provision of law.

Delegation agreements are not intergovernmental agreements pursuant to A.R.S. Title 11, Chapter 7, Article 3. For at least 30 days after publication of the Notice of Proposed Delegation Agreement in the Register, the agency shall provide persons the opportunity to submit in writing statements, arguments, data, and views on the proposed delegation agreement and shall provide an opportunity for a public hearing if there is sufficient interest. The delegating agency shall follow the procedures for delegation agreements specified in A.R.S. Title 41, Chapter 6, Article 8.

4. A summary of the delegation agreement and the subjects and issues involved:

Under A.R.S. §49-107, the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality proposes to amend the delegation agreement with Cochise County, the Local Agency (LA), to conform to an updated 2016 template that replaces the reference to A.R.S. §11-952 with §49-107; and would prohibit public disclosure of confidential information related to critical infrastructure and drinking water system vulnerability assessments consistent with A.R.S. §§ 41-1803(G) and 49-205 at new B.5; eliminate licensing timeframe fee-related reporting requirements in Paragraph C.1 after repeal of A.R.S. §41-1078; clarify in Paragraph D.3. that delegated agency employees have final sign-off on licensing decisions and perform any actual enforcement work; include e-verify requirements pursuant to A.R.S. §§41-4401(A) and 23-214(A) in Paragraph E and Non-Discrimination language in Paragraph F; add standard state contract language to paragraph G concerning record keeping and reporting; replace the word “intent” with “request” in Paragraph I.6; clarify in Paragraph J.2 that ADEQ will pay for the Office of Administrative Hearing’s costs on behalf of the County, not County costs, conditioned upon the availability of funds; reduce reporting frequency from quarterly to annual in Paragraph K.1 for compliance with state licensing timeframes applicable to delegated Functions and Duties; add language concerning governing law and venue in Paragraph M; separate Amendment Procedures from Termination Procedures and require termination notice to specify effective date; add severability clause as Paragraph R; add to the signature page language to memorialize the date of approval by the County Board of Supervisors; and update program contacts.

The proposed delegation agreement makes the following changes to Appendix A, Water Quality Management:

- Paragraph C - Update Personnel Qualifications per A.A.C. R9-16-402
- Paragraph E.1 – Reduce reporting frequency from quarterly to annual.
- Paragraph E.3 –Eliminate reporting of item (e)

The proposed delegation agreement makes the following change to Appendix B, Solid Waste Management:

- Paragraph C - Update Personnel Qualifications per A.A.C. R9-16-402
- Paragraph E.2. - Clarify that list of septic tank inspections includes inspection dates

All other delegated program elements remain the same as the current delegation agreement.

Where there is sufficient public interest, ADEQ will hold a public hearing to receive public comments, in accordance with A.R.S. § 41-1081. The time, place, and location of the hearings will be provided in the corresponding Notice of Public Hearing pursuant to A.A.C. R18-1-401 and R18-1-402.

ADEQ accepts written statements, arguments, data, and views on the proposed delegation agreement that are received within 30 days after the date of the publication of this notice in the *Register* by 5:00 p.m. or postmarked not later than that date.

After the conclusion of the public comment period and hearing, if any, the agency shall prepare a written summary responding to the comments received, whether oral or written. The agency shall consider the comments received from the public in determining whether to enter into the proposed delegation agreement. The agency shall give written notice to those persons who submitted comments of the agency’s decision on whether to enter into the proposed delegation agreement.

EXECUTIVE ORDER 2017-02

Internal Review of Administrative Rules; Moratorium to Promote Job Creation and Customer-Service-Oriented Agencies

[M17-23]

Editor's Note: This Executive Order is being reproduced in each issue of the Administrative Register until its expiration on December 31, 2017, as a notice to the public regarding state agencies' rulemaking activities.

WHEREAS, burdensome regulations inhibit job growth and economic development;

WHEREAS, job creators and entrepreneurs are especially hurt by red tape and regulations;

WHEREAS, all government agencies of the State of Arizona should promote customer-service-oriented principles for the people that it serves;

WHEREAS, each State agency should undertake a critical and comprehensive review of its administrative rules and take action to reduce the regulatory burden, administrative delay, and legal uncertainty associated with government regulation;

WHEREAS, overly burdensome, antiquated, contradictory, redundant, and nonessential regulations should be repealed;

WHEREAS, Article 5, Section 4 of the Arizona Constitution and Title 41, Chapter 1, Article 1 of the Arizona Revised Statutes vests the executive power of the State of Arizona in the Governor;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Douglas A. Ducey, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Arizona hereby declare the following:

1. A State agency subject to this Order, shall not conduct any rulemaking except as permitted by this Order.
2. A State agency subject to this Order, shall not conduct any rulemaking, whether informal or formal, without the prior written approval of the Office of the Governor. In seeking approval, a State agency shall address one or more of the following as justification for the rulemaking:
 - a. To fulfill an objective related to job creation, economic development, or economic expansion in this State.
 - b. To reduce or ameliorate a regulatory burden while achieving the same regulatory objective.
 - c. To prevent a significant threat to the public health, peace, or safety.
 - d. To avoid violating a court order or federal law that would result in sanctions by a court of the federal government against an agency for failure to conduct the rulemaking action.
 - e. To comply with a federal statutory or regulatory requirement if such compliance is related to a condition for the receipt of federal funds or participation in any federal program.
 - f. To comply with a state statutory requirement.
 - g. To fulfill an obligation related to fees or any other action necessary to implement the State budget that is certified by the Governor's Office of Strategic Planning and Budgeting.
 - h. To promulgate a rule or other item that is exempt from Title 41, Chapter 6, Arizona Revised Statutes, pursuant to section 41-1005, Arizona Revised Statutes.
 - i. To address matters pertaining to the control, mitigation, or eradication of waste, fraud, or abuse within an agency or wasteful, fraudulent, or abusive activities perpetrated against an agency.
 - j. To eliminate rules that are antiquated, redundant or otherwise no longer necessary for the operation of state government.
3. All directors of state agencies subject to this Order shall engage their respective regulated or stakeholder communities to solicit comment on which rules the regulated community believes to be overly burdensome and not necessary to protect consumers, public health, or public safety. Each agency shall submit a report regarding the aforementioned information to the Governor's Office no later than September 1, 2017.
4. For the purposes of this Order, the term "State agencies," includes without limitation, all executive departments, agencies, offices, and all state boards and commissions, except for: (a) any State agency that is headed by a single elected State official, (b) the Corporation Commission and (c) any board or commission established by ballot measure during or after the November 1998 general election. Those State agencies, boards and commissions excluded from this Order are strongly encouraged to voluntarily comply with this Order in the context of their own rulemaking processes.
5. This Order does not confer any legal rights upon any persons and shall not be used as a basis for legal challenges to rules, approvals, permits, licenses or other actions or to any inaction of a State agency. For the purposes of this Order, "person," "rule," and "rulemaking" have the same meanings prescribed in Arizona Revised Statutes Section 41-1001.
